wasn't breathing or anything. Her eyes didn't

1 There was no heart beat, and you checked. You pushed. You didn't want to push to hard 2 because she was a brand new baby, but you pushed 3 just to check and there was no heart beat. You <u> 1</u> 5 held her for a little bit there like on your lap. 6 And then you wrapped her in a towel and you went 7 downstairs with her into the garage. Got maybe it's called like -- I'm just going to call like 8 9 your mom's garden shovel or semething like that. 10 And took her out and put her in that shallow grave 11 right out in the backyard. And you didn't put the 12 towel in there, you just put her in there and covered her up. Okay? Is that -- does that sound 13 right like what we talked about Friday? Okay. Well, now where we are -- obviously, you know, we where there a long time that day and everything digging up her remains and everything. But now after speaking with the doctors who have been doing this, you know, they've been working a lot of hours just with her remains, you know, just tiny bone by tiny bone and everything. And they have a lot of evidence that they have presented to us where they know now from a medically scientific certainty they know there were other things that happened.

I think that you want to give her a proper proper burial and you want to give her a proper final resting situation. But in order to do that we need to know everything, okay? You cannot go back and change anything that you did. But we can have it out there and you can just say it, okay?

If you need to close your eyes to say it if you need to whatever, but it's very important that you tell us everything that happened because the doctors already know, okay? They've already shared with us what happened.

Now, there's things we don't know

1 like why or kind of what you were thinking or, you know, what would -- what would push someone to 3 feel like this was the only option, you know --3 SKYLAR: You think I killed her? . 21 DET. CARTER: That's not what I'm 5 6 saying. That's not what I'm saying. What I'm saying is what happened when you decided that you were -- before you buried her, okay? So all of 9. those things we need to know, okay. They're going 9 1.0 to be able to tell us medically what happened. So 11 it's really important because I want to know why, I want to know, you know, did you feel like that 12 was your only option? Did you feel like you had 13 no choice? You know, so those are-some things 14 15 that we know. Okay? 16 We obviously know she was buried because we found her. And then there's things. 17 1.8 that they can tell from the tissue and stuff 19 that's left, okay? So we know that some more 20 things happened.
